

# Celebrate Together



## Description:

An object lesson, a video and a celebration

## Aims:

- Recognize and appreciate God's Word as a precious gift
- Thank God for having a Bible that they can understand
- Pray for those who still wait for God's Word in their own languages

## Pre-class Preparations:

- Wrap a Bible as a beautiful gift. You may want to place it in a box before wrapping it so that the shape and size of the package don't give away the identity of the contents. Include cards in the package with the verses listed on page 1 under "Scripture to Study" except Nehemiah 8:12, written on them. If time and student proficiency allows for students to look up the verses, you may want to only write the chapter and verse references.
- Make copies of activity page 15 (page 5 of this lesson).
- Download and print information about dedication celebrations from:

- Set up computer and projector pointed toward screen or blank wall
- Cue up "*Life Without the Bible*" and/or "*KC's Travels: Celebrate!*" from the resource CD

## Class Time:

### OBJECT LESSON

**Hold up the package containing the Bible for the children to see. Tell them,**

This package contains an incredible gift. It gives joy, light and protection. It is pure, sweeter than honey, and more valuable than gold. God wants *everyone* to have it. Can you guess the contents of this package?

**After the children have taken a few guesses, invite one or two students to the front. Ask them to open the package and display its contents to the whole group. Say,**

Did the Bible disappoint you? Maybe you wished for candy or the latest computer game. The Bible is more *wonderful* than either of those gifts! Let's read these verses so we can understand the Bible's value better.

**Ask volunteers to read the verses listed on the cards. After they read them all, say,**

Wow! God's Word, the Bible, truly is an amazing and powerful gift.

## Materials:

- Bible
- Box (optional)
- Wrapping paper
- Five note cards or slips of paper with Bible verses written on them

## CELEBRATION DISCUSSION

### Tell the students,

Imagine what it would be like if you didn't have the wonderful gift of God's Word in the language you understand best. Now, imagine finally receiving one. How would you feel? Let's read about how some people celebrated receiving God's Word in their own language for the first time.

**Read activity page 15 together. Use the explanations from <http://www.discipleland.com/downloads/moreinfo/celebrate.pdf> to help children understand some unusual ways that people have celebrated God's Word.**

## VIDEO CLIP

### Tell the children,

Let's watch this video and find out how people from around the world felt when they received God's Word in their own languages.

**Play "Life Without the Bible" from the resource CD or play a short clip (five minutes maximum) from a Bible dedication.**

### Ask,

How did these people feel about having God's Word in their own languages?

**Allow a few children to respond.**

## SCRIPTURE DISCUSSION

### Read Nehemiah 8:12. Tell the children,

We will end the class with our own celebration of God's Word.

## CELEBRATION PLANNING

**Divide the children into groups of two to four. Give them the following instructions.**

I want each group to create a way to celebrate having God's Word in your own language. You may want to write a poem, a song or a play; or you may want to draw a picture. Use your creative minds to express your thankfulness to God for His Word in your language.

**Give the groups 10 minutes to work on their projects.**

**Ask each group to present their creations.**

## **CELEBRATE AND PRAY**

**Tell the children,**

Let's finish our celebration by enjoying a snack and watching a video. Then we will close with a prayer of thanks to God.

**Distribute cookies or some other treat and watch the *KC's Travels: Celebrate* clip from the Resource CD as the children enjoy their treat.**

**Close by thanking God for His Word in our language and asking Him to send His Word to those who still don't have it.**
